

Perinatal and Infant Mental Health

Mental health and well-being during the perinatal period (from conception to 18 months after the baby is born) is of crucial importance for mothers, babies and families. Mental ill-health at this time, when it is not recognised and supported / treated, can have long-term impacts on physical and mental health outcomes for mothers and babies and presents a major public health concern.

Over the last few weeks, we've been speaking with colleagues from <u>The Perinatal Mental Health</u> <u>Network</u>, <u>Perinatal & Infant Mental Health Programme Board</u> and <u>Maternal Mental Health Scotland</u> to learn how we can join up to wrap services and care around women and babies.

Perinatal and Infant Mental Health Champions

In collaboration with NHS Education for Scotland, a range of professional educational and training resources has been developed and can be accessed at learn.nes/perinatal-and-infant-mental-health

NES and PMHN are currently liaising with health visitors, midwives and other colleagues to develop further training, based on the 'train the trainer' model, to support primary care professionals in Scotland to become *Perinatal Mental Health Champions*. New PReCePT: Prevention of Cerebral Palsy in Preterm Labour e-learning

Health Education England e-Learning for Healthcare (HEE e-LfH), in partnership with the ASHN Network, have developed a new, free e-learning programme for perinatal healthcare professionals.

The PReCePT: Prevention of Cerebral Palsy in Preterm Labour e-learning programme has been designed for perinatal healthcare professionals to support education around the administration of magnesium sulphate to mothers in preterm labour for neonatal neuroprotection. This module will guide clinicians through the clinical benefits of administering magnesium sulphate (MgSO4) to mothers who go into labour before 30 weeks gestation. It will provide information on the neuroprotective qualities of this cost-effective and readily available drug, the detail of how it is administered and the positive impact it can have on the lives of neonates and their families.

National Neonatal Network Update

British Paediatric Surveillance Unit Study

This month marks the start of a new BPSU project aiming to describe the outcome of term babies who receive resuscitation at birth and have no detectable heart beat at 10 minutes. The study will identify the incidence of these infants, describing the demographic characteristics, clinical features and initial management of this population; describe the mortality rate, timing and cause of death for infants who die, and describe the neurodevelopmental outcome at one and two years of age for survivors.

The study team would like to acknowledge the support of the BPSU, as well as colleagues at PBPP, CAG, MBRRACE, and Public Health Scotland in reaching this important milestone.

The lead investigators are Dr Gemma Sullivan and Dr Ewen Johnston from Simpson Centre for Reproductive Health, Edinburgh. The rest of the team are: Dr. Julie-Clare Becher (SCRH), Professor Ben Stenson (SCRH), Professor Elaine Boyle (University of Leicester), Professor Colm O'Donnell (National Maternity Hospital, Dublin).

Development of National Guidelines

The Network National Guideline group, chaired by Dr Andrew Powls and Dr David Quine is developing national guidance for the identification, testing and follow up of premature babies with chronic lung disease requiring domiciliary oxygen. The group is multi-disciplinary with representation from medical staff, trainees, neonatal nursing liaison services and service users. The responsibility of all group members is to ensure two-way communication with the units/groups they represent to assist in developing guidance that is representative of the requirements of services across Scotland. Developing guidance in this collaborative, iterative and inclusive manner should, we hope, also support local implementation and governance processes.
