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National Maternity Network Update

Remote and Rural

Scotland is a country with some very remote and rural areas which, beautiful as they are, can be intimidating places to be when urgent obstetric or neonatal care becomes necessary.

The National Neonatal Network has been working alongside ScotSTAR for some months to improve care when new babies require transfer from these remote areas in acute situations.

More recently, the National Maternity Network team have begun supporting the work of a Best Start remote and rural working group, to develop parallel user-friendly materials to support maternal transfer. The materials will aim to help midwives in acute situations assess women for appropriateness and urgency of transfer and, where appropriate, easily access the multidisciplinary help they need to move women safely and in a timely way.

The materials will shortly be shared with Heads of Midwifery and the Obstetric Clinical Leads across Scotland to seek their input. They will then move into an initial testing phase before hopefully a wider roll out later in the year.

We'll keep you up to date with progress and if you come across any of the new materials in your practice please feedback to us on the evaluation forms that will accompany them.

Management of Maternal Pyrexia of Unknown Origin in Labour

A recent serious adverse event review in a Scottish Health Board highlighted differing clinical interpretation and application of guidance around the treatment of maternal pyrexia in labour; resulting in inconsistent practice.

Concerns were discussed at the National Obstetric and Gynaecology Clinical Leads group and the National Maternity Network was asked to develop and recommend a standardised approach to operationalising the existing evidence base.

A group including senior obstetric, midwifery and neonatal colleagues from across Scotland has formed and met for the first time in March. The group, chaired by Dr Evelyn Ferguson from NHS Lanarkshire, will look to publish guidance which will be recommended for national use by early autumn.



National Neonatal Network Update

Data Sharing Event

The Neonatal Network held its first virtual data sharing event in March. This was extremely well attended with shared learning and presentations from units across the country. It was a really collaborative afternoon with an opportunity to review Scottish NNAP data prior to final submission on 31st March.

Review of Deliveries <27 Weeks in Non NICUs

A Scotland wide perinatal review of deliveries < 27 weeks delivered out with NICUs during 2020 is planned for early summer. Whilst some of these deliveries may have been unavoidable there may be learning on missed opportunities for an in-utero transfer to a NICU. Such reviews are a NNAP recommendation for Networks. A date for this event will be circulated shortly. The Network team have been in communication with ODNs in England on their experience and processes for exception reporting which we hope to start by late summer on a quarterly basis.

AHP Forum

A scoping meeting took place in February with a first meeting planned for April 2021. The first remit of this group will be developing a communication network for AHPs across the country and a scoping exercise on AHP numbers and resources across units recognising the existing variation. This forum is open to all AHPs.
